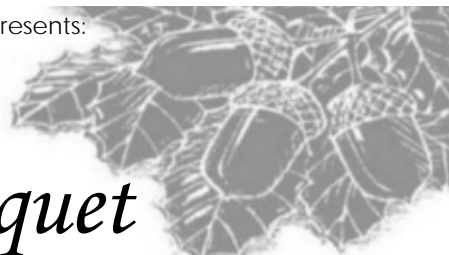

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Hundreds Will Walk in the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society's Light The Night Fundraising Event

Hundreds of families and corporate teams are gearing up to walk at the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society's annual Light The Night Walk at Burgess Park, Menlo Park, this fall on Saturday, October 14, 2006. Pro Football Hall of Famer, Ronnie Lott will be the Honorary Chair for the event.

At Light The Night Walks across the country and in Canada, participants carry illuminated balloons at dusk. Blood cancer survivors walk with white balloons, while their friends and families carry red balloons, during an easy 45-minute walk that is easy for the whole family.

Last year, \$540,000 was raised in the Silicon Valley. This year a new site in South San Francisco has been added with the goal to raise \$1,000,000.

"The support The Society received each year from Menlo Park residents and the surrounding communities is overwhelming," said Executive Director Michele Thompson. "More and more individuals, families and businesses continue to come out each year for the Light The Night Walk to have fun and ultimately help us get closer to a cure."

Leukemia, lymphoma and myeloma are all blood cancers. Every 5 minutes someone in the United States is diagnosed with a blood cancer and every ten minutes someone dies from one of these diseases. Money raised by Light the Night walkers supports blood cancer research and patient services.

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MEDICAL INSURANCE ALPHABET SOUP

Confused by **PPO, HMO, FSA, HSA**, etc, etc? Hopefully we can help sort it out for you.

When medical insurance was first sold, the insured (purchaser) would go to their physician or hospital (provider), receive treatment, and submit the billing to the insurance company that issued the policy for either payment to the provider or reimbursement to the insured.

To reduce the cost of treatment and make their product more cost-effective insurers established **Preferred Provider Organizations (PPO)**. To establish a **PPO** the insurer would approach health care providers offering to send business their way if they reduce their charges. Providers who agree to do so are known as the network. Insurers would induce their insureds to obtain services from the network by paying a greater percentage of the billing. The initial effect of **PPOs** was to reduce the cost of medical care. The insured had to be careful to make sure the providers they wanted to use were part of the network. If they were not, the insured would pay a greater portion of the provider's billed fees.

The next step in cost reduction was to establish **Health Maintenance Organizations (HMO)**. The economic effect was to turn the

providers into insurance vehicles. There are many different ways in which HMO's can be administered; a defining feature is the primary care physician (PCP). The PCP acts as a "gatekeeper" for the medical needs that the PCP can not provide. If the insured needs to see a specialist, he or she must first see their PCP to obtain a referral. The advantages to **HMO** plans are that they focus on keeping the member healthy as opposed to treating them when they get sick and ultimately spend less money on health care. In addition, members generally pay very little out of pocket when accessing care in a **HMO**. The primary disadvantage is that there is generally no benefit when seeing a healthcare professional that is not part of the **HMO**, so the member is restricted to seeing providers in the **HMO** network.

As the cost of healthcare increases and many employers are forced to reduce benefits more employees are starting to use **Flexible Spending Accounts (FSA)** to save on their out-of-pocket healthcare expenses. Section 125 of the IRS tax code allows employers to offer their employees **FSA** plans in which participants set aside money on a pre-tax basis to pay for certain qualified expenses. The main disadvantage to these plans is the "use it or lose it rule".

Another health insurance strategy is a **High Deductible Health Plan (HDHP)** used in conjunction with a **Health Savings Account (HSA)**. The **HDHP** is a **PPO** plan that provides catastrophic coverage for the member in the event of an emergency, but no coverage for more minor, day to day, or preventative medical expenses. The member pays for these expenses out of the **HSA**, which is similar to a **FSA** with one key difference. The member can roll over any unused amount at the end of the year and earn interest on it. Adoption of **FSA, HDHP** and **HSA** should involve consultation with your tax advisor.

RECENT BUSINESS LAW DECISIONS



“Tools to Ward Off A Disaster.” That was a Wall Street Journal headline in July. The article addressed how a businessperson may arrange protection against claimants and creditors. *The following strategies were raised: segregate business and personal risks; buy “umbrella insurance”; maximize state exemptions under applicable state bankruptcy laws; use trusts; and “equity-strip” your assets.* Coincidentally, in the same month, a California appellate court, in Laycock v. Hammer, held that a judgment creditor could not reach the assets of an irrevocable trust. In 1989, Spearl Ellison created the trust. Hammer thereafter obtained a judgment against Ellison in excess of \$4 million. Even though Ellison allegedly acted as the co-trustee and allegedly borrowed against trust assets, the court would not allow Hammer to reach the trust’s assets.

A Lesson on How to Defend Yourself Against a Potential Oral Contract Claim. In Bustamonte v. Intuit, Inc. (July 2006), Bustamonte had been negotiating with Intuit about a joint venture to introduce Intuit’s software into Mexico. When Intuit informed Bustamonte that it did not want to pursue the project, Bustamonte sued for breach of oral contract. Fortunately for Intuit, its communications made clear that it had

insisted upon a substantial initial investment by an outside party, which did not materialize, so there was no evidence that there was a meeting of the minds. *When you are discussing a potential transaction with a business associate, you may wish to document some of your key requirements, so that collapsed negotiations cannot readily be converted into a breach of oral contract claim.*

A New Negotiation Tool When Dealing with Insurers. In Essex Insurance Co. v. Five Star Dye House, Inc. (July 2006), the California Supreme Court held that an assignment of a bad faith claim against an insurer may include the right to recover attorney’s fees. Louis Sanchez had transported a dryer for Five Star, and the dryer was damaged en route. Five Star sued Sanchez, who tendered his defense to Essex. After Essex refused to provide a defense, Sanchez undertook a defense using his own funds, which resulted in a judgment against him for \$1.35 million plus costs. Sanchez then assigned to Five Star all of his claims and causes of action against Essex. Essex sued for declaratory relief, and Five Star filed a cross complaint for breach of contract and bad faith. The trial court awarded Five Star \$1.6 million but denied its request for attorney’s fees under Brandt v. Superior Court,

in which the California Supreme Court had held that one may recover the attorney’s fees incurred in collecting due benefits under an insurance policy. The Supreme Court overruled the trial court’s denial of Brandt fees, and thereby rejected earlier appellate court rulings. *The Supreme Court thereby raised the stakes for an insurance company when it denies a defense.*

Be Careful When Acting as an Escrow Holder. In Virtanen v. O’Connell (June 2006), a California appellate court held that an attorney violated his duties as an escrow holder when he went forward with a transaction, to his own client’s benefit, after receiving the other party’s notice of rescission. The court agreed with the attorney that an escrow holder confronted with conflicting demands must either hold the property or interplead it (that is, put it before a court). The attorney had contended that he knew the parties would litigate the matter, so he was effectively filing an interpleader action when he transferred the property. That misperception resulted in a \$2 million judgment against the attorney and his law firm. *Evaluate how to mitigate your risk if considering being an intermediary.*

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SRI International Celebrates 60 Years of Innovation

Long a familiar fixture on Ravenswood Avenue, SRI International celebrates its 60th anniversary on November 6, 2006. Founded by Stanford University and California business executives to encourage economic development in the western U.S., the institute got its start as the Stanford Research Institute. More than 25,000 staff members have worked at the independent, nonprofit institute over the decades.

SRI addresses important issues in health, energy and the environment, information technology and communications,

national security, education, and economic development. SRI innovations touch our lives daily when we use the Internet, talk on a mobile phone, write a check, watch a movie, or mail a letter.

SRI is famous for many of its inventions, but there are others with which you may not be familiar. For example, you may know that SRI researchers invented the computer mouse, but did you know that SRI revolutionized banking in the 1950s with the creation of the first automatic check processing system? Called ERMA, for electronic recording machine accounting, the system was developed for the Bank of America to replace laborious manual recordkeeping. ERMA incorporated another SRI innovation, "magnetic ink character recognition", or MICR – those little numbers you can still see across

the bottom of checks. You may also know that the area around the "Dish" radar facility in the hills above Stanford University is a popular place for hiking and running. But did you know that SRI built and operates the Dish for the U.S. Government? Among its other uses today, the Dish provides the first calibration for GPS satellites put into orbit.



A local landmark, the "Big Dish" was built and is operated by SRI engineers for the U.S. Government.

SRI has had a hand in how people are entertained, too. In the 1950s, Walt Disney hired SRI to analyze locations and the economic feasibility for his theme park concept. SRI recommended Anaheim,

California, for Disneyland, which is now visited by millions from around the world. To help save and improve lives, SRI invented telerobotic surgery in the 1990s, and spun off Intuitive Surgical, Inc. in 1995 to bring the technology to market. Today, surgeons throughout the U.S., Europe, and Asia use Intuitive's da Vinci Surgical System to operate on patients through minimally invasive "ports", which helps patients recover faster and with less pain.

SRI was once dubbed "The Soul of Silicon Valley". Since its beginnings 60 years ago, the institute has created a wealth of innovations that help transform governments, businesses, and people's lives.
